

### September 1, 2013 Licensure Deadline Fast Approaching:

In October of 2012, the New York State Education Department began sending notices to individuals with New York State Limited Licenses to remind them of their obligations to complete all licensure requirements by September 1<sup>st</sup>, 2013. *Limited Licenses will not be valid or renewed after the expiration date nor will this transition pathway be available*. It is imperative that these individuals complete all the necessary educational requirements and pass the examination to ensure that they can remain employed in a clinical laboratory in New York State.

The "Limited License" transition pathway was created for individuals <u>with an associates degree</u> (or higher) in the sciences who <u>did</u> <u>not meet</u> the educational requirements mandated by the regulations. The limited license was intended to provide a "window of opportunity" for these individuals; who may be employed or seeking enrollment in an educational program, to complete any and all necessary coursework and take the examination prior to the expiration date of the Limited License. Please note that all educational requirements must fulfilled/completed prior to taking the examination.

With essentially one academic semester left prior to the expiration of the Limited License individuals should contact the two registered license qualifying programs within New York State where an individual may obtain the necessary coursework to fulfill their educational requirements: SUNY Cobleskill (campus based) and Broome County Community College (campus and distance based). Coursework may also be obtained from programs outside New York State, however additional time may be needed to review the application so it is highly advised that the process start as soon as possible.

At this time, the New York State Education Department highly recommends that individuals with Limited Licenses submit their application for licensure by May 1 of 2013 in order to allow the Department sufficient time to review and approve the application. Individuals with associate degrees (or higher) who are still unsure if they meet all the educational requirements, may submit the application with the forms documenting the additional course work completed to date (degree documentation is already on file as part of the limited license application) so that the Department may review and notify of you of any incomplete requirements. 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### Winter Letter



I would like to start off by making sure that you all read the legislative update in this issue. We are coming up on the termination of the last transition pathway for NYS state licensure since the 2008 amendment to the Clinical Laboratory Practice Act. On September 1<sup>st</sup> 2013, all limited licenses issued since the inception of the law will expire and cannot be renewed. If you are working under the "Limited License" category at this time, you should have received a

letter notifying you of your options. Individuals who are working under the limited license category have until 9/1/2013 to complete and submit all the required documentation (including satisfactory completion of the educational requirements) and pass the examination in order to be licensed and be able to continue to practice in New York State. Please see the article for more information and be sure to communicate this info to any of your colleagues.

New York State and Region 1 had a great turnout at the 2012 NSH convention in Vancouver, British Columbia. The convention center, located along the water front, had a spectacular view of Coal Harbor and Lord Stanley's Park and the weather cooperated for the entire event. All the state presidents from Region 1 were in attendance as well as fifteen "first timers" from throughout the region. The BOD met again on Tues for a full meeting. The next item was the ByLaws Committee members. The BOD decided that there should be representation from each region on the ByLaws Committee. One individual from each region will be on the committee under the direct supervision of the Committee Chair. When the minutes of the full meeting are available, I will have them available to all members. The House of Delegates met on Wed. Oct 3. There were 105 members seated. The BOD held their post board meeting on Thursday Oct. 4. Again, many items were discussed and meeting minutes will be available soon. The most significant item of business was the creation of a new \$1500 scholarship for a new member, newly certified both in the US and Canada and one International. This scholarship allows first time members to be eligible for the scholarship instead of having to be a member for a year before applying.

#### IQ and Ethics By: Nathan Jentsch Muhlbauer Lab

When I attended the Missouri Academy of Science, Mathematics and Computing, I was introduced to the concept of IQ. The administration was trying to be clever since the Academy was an accelerated program for high school students. IQ stood for Integrity and Quality. As students representing the program on campus, we were expected to practice and show both of these qualities, and by the end of the first year, every person in my class was sick of hearing the phrase. The following year, the IQ concept was removed from the curriculum, and we saw the difference in the class under us. Our class actually started preaching the concepts to those students once we realized how important they were not only to the image of the school but also to being a good and respectable person out in the world.

Now I find myself in a field where I am constantly handling sensitive patient information as well as tissue from them that may significantly impact their life. I watch and listen as others say, "It's just a skin tag, so it doesn't matter," or "You're holding me up. Just crank out the ribbons so I can load my slides," or, "It's not fixed, but it's a stat case. Just do it and let it soak in paraffin longer." IQ has worked its way back out of the recesses of my memory to provide me with a strong foundation for dealing with these ethical issues.

Dictionary.com describes integrity as "adherence to moral and ethical principles, honesty, a state of being undiminished" and quality as "high grade, superiority, excellence". What do any of these concepts mean to us as technicians in the laboratory?

To adhere to principles, they first need to be established. Often times such principles are defined by professional societies such as NSH, NYSHS, or ASCP. Sometimes they can be decided by law makers. I find, however, that the most effective principles are the ones you establish yourself. When you follow a preset list of ethics, you try to make sure you don't break the rules because you don't want to be arrested or fined. When you violate your own principles, a sense of true guilt and shame sets in because you have disappointed a very important person in your life, you. All any of us has to do to decide what is ethical, is to imagine that the specimen is our own. How would we want it processed? Would we sacrifice our own quality for speed? What if it belonged to a loved one? Treating every specimen like it is yours will set you on the track to establishing a list of principles.

Honesty can mean simply not lying to or deceiving someone, but in the lab it has more to do with owning your actions. If specimens come off a processor extra crispy because you selected the wrong program for that tissue, don't hide in the break room while your colleagues struggle, wondering what happened. Go out and admit your error, and do whatever you can to help. Don't make it out to be a shared responsibility either. "Jackie distracted me, and that's why I didn't notice I selected the wrong program," isn't being honest. That is just trying to drag someone down with you so that you don't feel so bad.

"A state of being undiminished" applies to your integrity as a whole person, not just a technician. Remember that you aren't a robot turning wheels and mixing chemicals. You are a human being with thoughts and feelings, and you work with others who are the same way. Don't treat your fellow technicians, or the lab assistants, or the doctors or even the janitorial staff as though they are anything less. Treat them all with respect, and apologize if you overstep a boundary out of ignorance, or if you happen to be having a bad day.

Producing work of "high grade, superiority and excellence" is essential to the diagnosis of the patient. Don't just cut it fast or put it through the processor just to get the slides out. Handle the specimen with integrity and the quality will inevitably follow. Having quality in the lab also applies to the quality of the workplace. Encouraging a positive work environment for everyone you work around, even if you don't like them, makes a lab run much more smoothly and helps everyone enjoy what they do.

I've just scratched the surface of what IQ can mean to us both as technician and as people. Even though it may seem like another corny acronym that people make up to put in employee training packets or management books, I encourage you to take it to heart and really think about your own integrity and quality. Apply it in your work life and daily life. I think you'll be surprised at the results.

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
